#### Deep Imagery: Opening the Window to the Imaginal World Eight Wednesday Evenings Jan. 21, 28; Feb 4,18,25; March 3,17,24 7 to 9 pm Led by Dianne Timberlake

As human beings we have different ways of knowing – of receiving information about ourselves and our world. We have the capacity to learn through thinking, feeling, sensing, and imagination. These four functions, however, are rarely developed in a balanced way. Our culture promotes thinking and sensing almost exclusively, but if we are to know ourselves at the deepest level, we must develop our imagination.

Depth psychologists say that the substance of the soul is image and that deep imagery (i.e. imagery that comes to us from the unconscious) is one of the most direct and powerful means of accessing soul.

This program is intended to open wide the window to the imaginal world – into knowing yourself through your own deeply personal imagery.

The particular imagery process we will be using is called The Personal Totem Pole. It has its roots in three traditions: Jungian active imagination, charka theory, and the belief of indigenous peoples worldwide in animals as spirit guides or totems.

During this eight week course, we will find an imagery guide for each of the seven main charkas (our own individual persona; totem pole), and then invite all of them to come into council with us to hear their wisdom for our lives.

Dianne Timberlake is a licensed Marriage and Family Therapist in private practice in Sebastopol. She is certified as a workshop leader and Trainer in The Personal Totem Pole Process by the International Institute for Visualization Research. During her almost twenty years of experience in working with this process, she has conducted many groups around the United States and in England and Wales.

Good Poems: A Conspiracy of Friendliness

A poetry writing workshop Eight Monday mornings, Jan. 26 to March 22 (no class Feb. 16) 10 am to noon Led by Lynn Trombetta

In this workshop we will use the anthology <u>Good Poems</u> Selected and Introduced by Garrison Keillor. Working from an anthology, rather than from a single poet's body of work, we will be introduced to many different kinds of poets, and kinds of poetry writing. Keillor offers a spectrum from Emily Dickinson and William Butler Yeats to contemporary poets like Robert Hass and Kay Ryan. Their work will inform and inspire our own writing. We will use some (but not all of) Keillor's themed sections as the basis for our weekly work and assignments. As always, whether looking at Keillor's poem of choice or our own writings we will focus on the poem's content and on those poetic behaviors (metaphor, music, imagery, line break, syntax, etc.) which craft our poems into works of mind as well as heart. We will study many of the fine poems in this collection; write new poems of our own and strengthen our imaginations and our writing lives.

Lynn Trombetta holds two teaching credentials and a BA in English from SSU. She has studied under major contemporary American poets and brings their insights to her workshops. Her poems have appeared in poetry journals across the country and in 2003 she was a nominee for Poet Laureate of Sonoma County. A member of the Sixteen Rivers Press, a poetry publishing collective based in San Francisco, her first full length collection of poems, *Falling World*, will be published on April of 2004.

#### Diversity: A Hallmark of Communities that Work for Justice

Three Tuesday evenings, March 2 through 16, 6:30 to 9:00 pm, Led by Kevin Dincher.

When a community takes on the tasks of tending to the well-being of all its members and its environment, that community finds itself more often and more deeply challenged by the demand of justice. And as a community responds to the challenges of justice, it finds that it grows into a more diverse community. In fact, increasing diversity is a sign of the genuineness – a hallmark – of the work that a community is doing to become just.

*Diversity: A Hallmark of Communities that Work for Justice* is a three session workshop exploring: What is justice? What is diversity? How does diversity arise from working for justice and how does greater diversity become a gift to communities? How have our communities become more just and more diverse? Where does the lack of diversity in our communities show us the need to work for greater justice?

#### The Wake Up Call of Post Modernism Four Wednesday Evenings March 17, 24, 31 and April 7 7 to 9pm

#### Led by Geoff Woods

What is Post-modernism? How does it affect our times and faith? This four session survey will analyze at least three post-modern pieces of literature; two novels by Jim Crace, i.e. "Quarantine" and "Being Dead" and another by James Cowan entitled "A Mapmaker's Dream". (Purchase and prior reading of the books would be useful but not required.) There will be further excursions in the writings of the Anglican theologian Don Cupitt, i.e. his radical, post-modern works "Emptiness and Brightness" and "Reforming Christianity".

Post-modernism is primarily critical of the modern world that commenced with Galileo and Descartes, the Age of Reason and Techno-scientific "progress". But it searches out to "emancipate" people from the Age of Faith as well. Where does that leave us? Well, one possible reaction to its incisive critique of the past can be a believer's reassessment of his or her own belief in God and Reason, which he or she has taken for granted and a revitalizing of the same. In other words, post-modernism confront us with choice where until now a believer's life may have been one of mere habit.

Post-modernism can be a wake up call and even a vantage point from which the believer can get over his or her feelings of inferiority brought on by the Age of Reason and Techno-science. The course will be centered on literature and a bit on art, old and new, as our means of understanding this late 20<sup>th</sup> century movement.

Dr. Wood has a Ph.D. in Sacred Theology from Catholic University, Washington, D.C. and a Licentiate in Sacred Scripture from Rome's Pontifical Bible University. He has taught at Catholic University, Swarthmore and Bucknell University.

A Theological Interpretation of Impressionist and Post-Impressionist Art

4 Wednesday Evenings April 14, 21, 28 and May 5 7:30 to 9pm Led by Geoffrey E. Wood., S.S.L., S.T.D.

In the Middle Ages and Renaissance religious topics were almost the sole subject of painting. Such paintings of sacred subjects like the Nativity or Call of St. Matthew or of the Madonna, the Flight into Egypt, the Crucifixion, Resurrection or Martyrdom of St. Sebastian to name a few such paintings were often done to serve as altar pieces before which the Eucharist might be celebrated. The paintings thus supplied a pictorial enhancement to meaning of the Eucharist's connection to sacred history.

By the nineteenth century art had become much more interested in secular subjects: seascapes, landscapes, still life, portraits, depictions of people dancing and working. But to the theological eye there is no such thing as a secular painting. All paintings say something about the holiness of creation. For that reason a painting of a wheatfield by Van Gogh might serve as an astounding altar piece, a supplement to the Eucharist, as much as an explicitly religious scene or figure. This course will explore the sacred hidden in the secular beauty of late nineteenth and early twentieth century art (mainly French). Warning: do not come expecting the kind of technical critique you might find on a campus and in an art gallery. The interpretation here will be theological and edifying (in the serious sense of that term).
